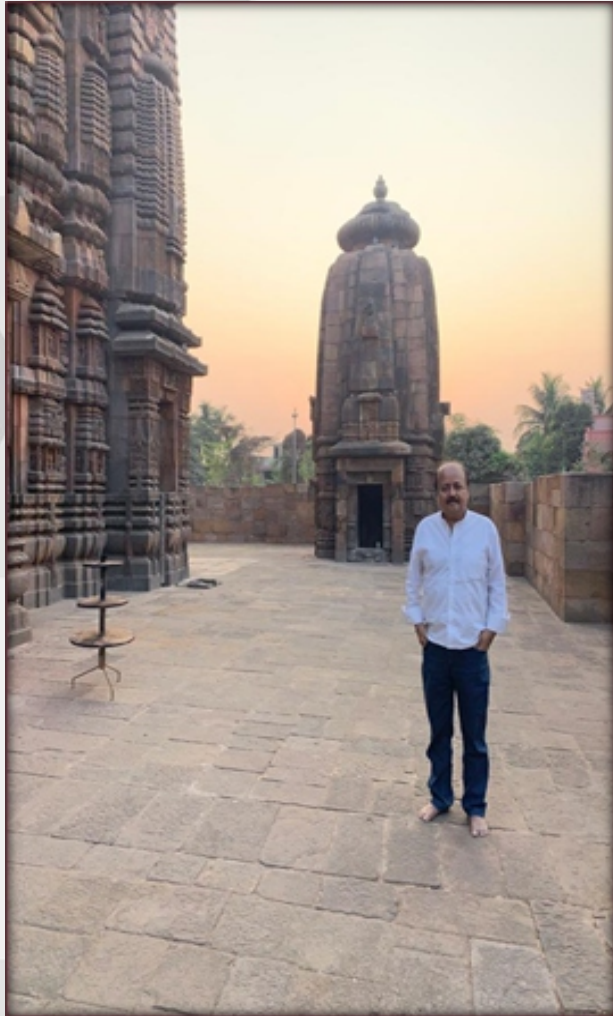

For us, this past year has seen several collaborations and partnerships that have contributed significantly to improving our reach and impact among tribal women and girls, especially from the most marginalised communities in the poorest and remotest regions, and have brought about meaningful and sustainable change in their lives and livelihoods. During the year, Sambandh has directly reached out to lakhs of people in 17 states across various projects through interventions in health, agriculture, livelihoods, and disaster preparedness and response. This was only possible by building cross-sectoral partnerships with various governments and non-government organizations and our generous donors, who together steadfastly supported us in planning, implementing, monitoring, knowledge generation, and delivering large scale impact on the ground.

Our other livelihood programme also included projects on climate smart agriculture, or as we very rightly call it, the CSA, which basically focuses on the techniques and methodologies of strategically dealing with climate change. Such projects have been a source of enlightenment not just for the people but for the organisation as well. I still couldn't express how grateful I am to our donors for how these innovative projects have impacted the lives of thousands of people.

Nutritional kitchen gardens and backyard poultry have been the core areas of Sambandh when it comes to sustainability and especially self-sustenance. Including nutritional kitchen gardens and backyard poultry has been the most efficient way that Sambandh has developed so that people can maintain their food habits and eat nutritious meals even after any project has undergone the exit strategy. The livelihood programme promoted sustainable livelihoods and skill-building of women, smallholder farmers, developed markets and value chains that are equitable and supported the entrepreneurship and employability of women. Our humanitarian efforts reached the unreached who were the most affected by natural disasters, providing them with timely relief and rehabilitation. The unabated spread of COVID-19 in the latter part of the year galvanised Sambandh to provide food security to the most vulnerable and COVID-19 awareness programmes to our field staff and to the village communities as well.

Sambandh has always been a keen thinker when it comes to its future activities. With our upcoming projects in the near future, we are hoping to spread our various innovativeness and uniqueness to as many people as possible and move towards exploring the needs of the rural population in other districts as well.

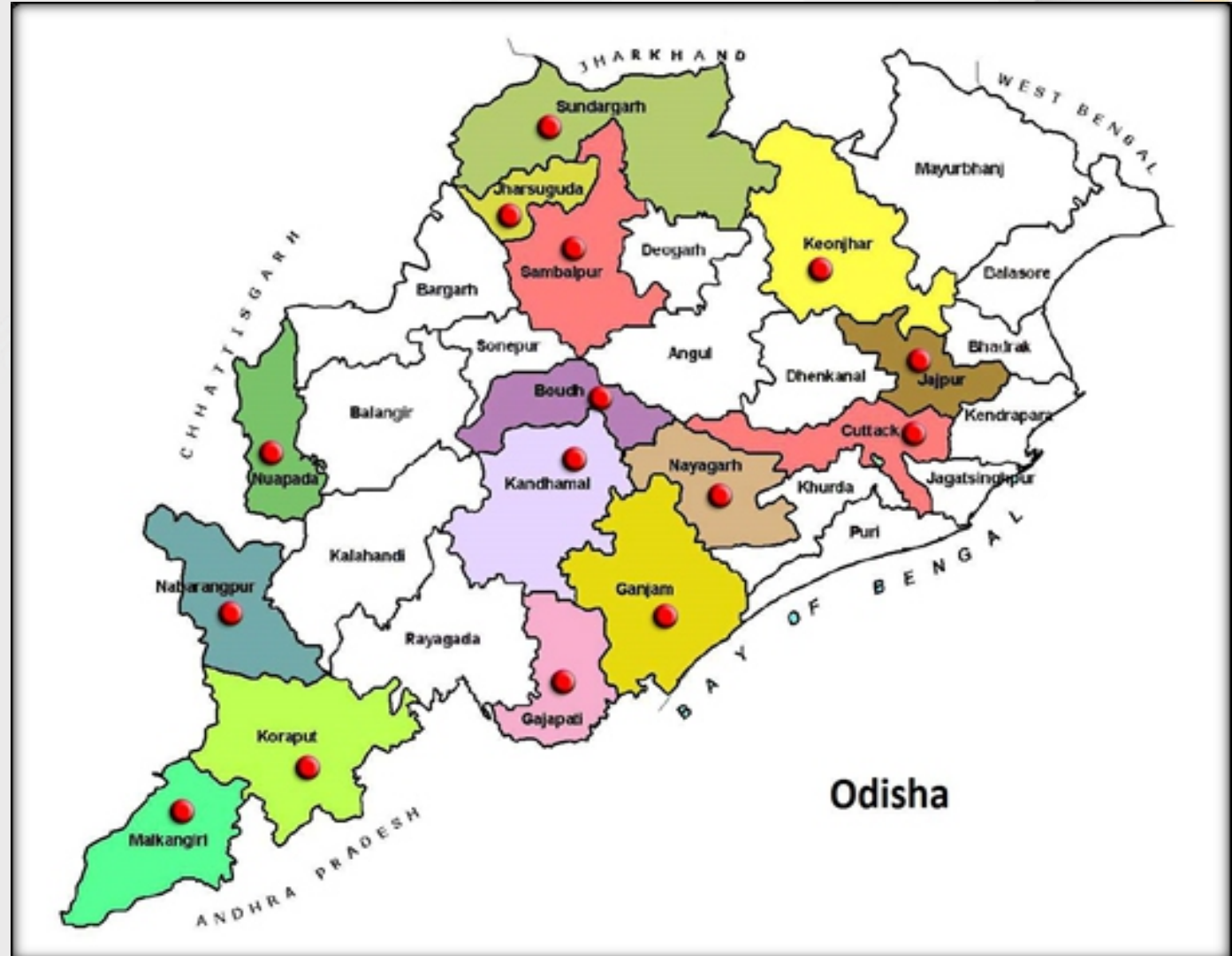

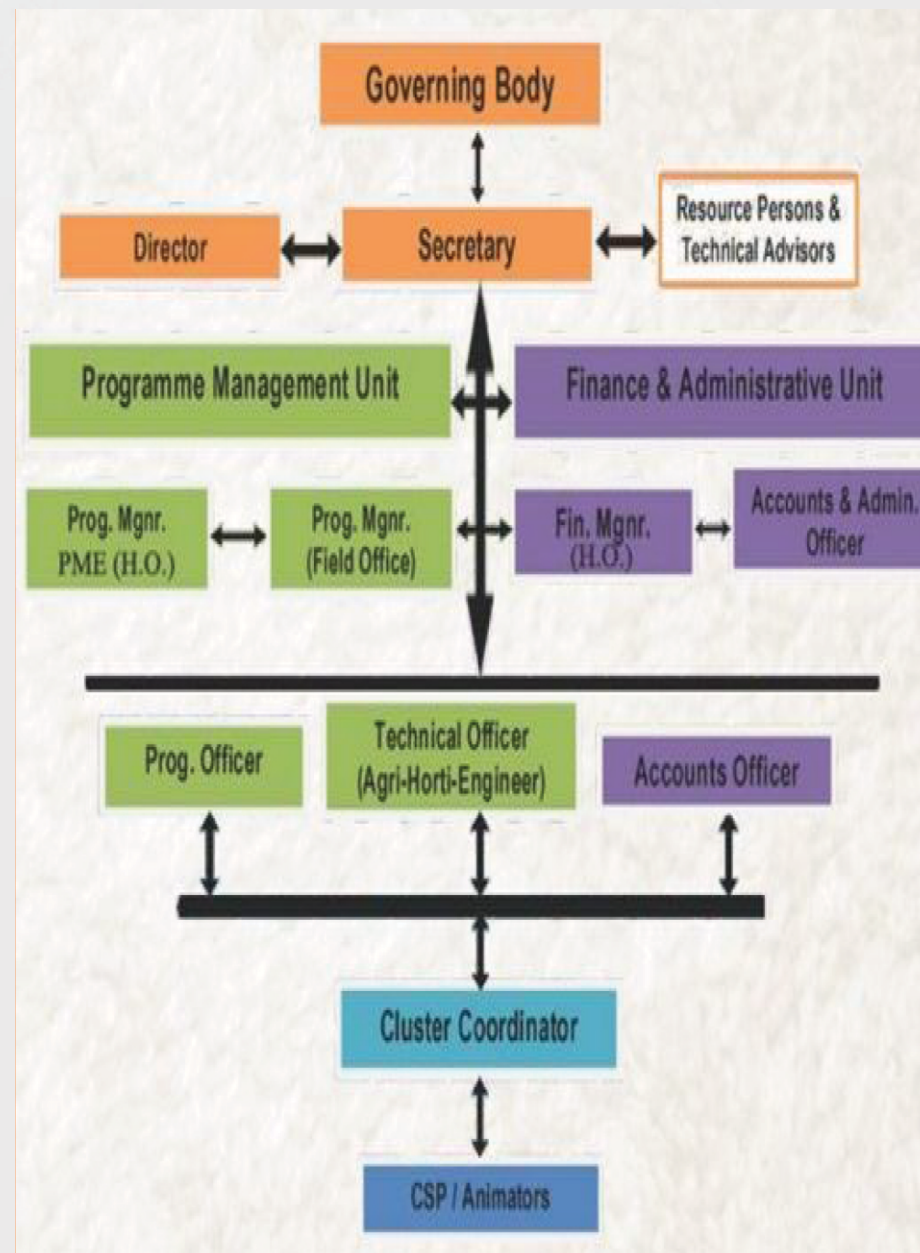

Sambandh's journey

Sambandh has completed 28 years of operation in Odisha, India this year. During this period, Sambandh has been focused on alleviating poverty and social exclusion by facilitating empowerment of women and girls from poor and marginalised communities, improving the standards of living of the tribal communities, addressing gender inequality and developing climate change mitigation strategies for a better future.

As a development and humanitarian organization, Sambandh's programmes are designed to work with the communities to catalyse demand for services and enhance their leadership skills, promote local capacities and create a supportive environment, strengthen systems to deliver quality and equitable services, and be with the people providing relief and rehabilitation in the event of disasters.

This has resulted in making a difference in the lives and livelihoods of lakhs of people in the financial year 2020–21, which places the organisation well ahead of its target by the end of 2021.

To be able to bring about the desired change in the communities served, Sambandh has developed an open and transparent organizational culture, based on the core values of respect, integrity, commitment, and excellence.

A robust governance structure and investments in further strengthening key functional capabilities ensured increased efficiency and accountability in work on the ground. Over the years, the organisation has emerged as a preferred partner for communities, governments (local, state and central), project implementation partners, donors and other key stakeholders by delivering planned outcomes at the grassroot level through innovative solutions, while also generating knowledge that can be shared and adapted to diverse development challenges. Thank you for your trust and support, without which we would not have been able to achieve this scale and depth of impact.



OUR SOCIAL INITIATIVES

EdelGive program – Water for life and livelihood:

Our association with the EdelGive foundation focuses especially on climate-smart agriculture for sustainable livelihood through integrated water shed management. Natural resource management with greater access and control by women in six villages from Dhalabani panchayat in Jashipur block, Mayurbhanj district. The aim of this project is to reduce food and nutritional insecurity in the proposed areas through the development of water resources to "enable rural households for sustainable livelihood opportunities."

Remarkable output:

- The investment in farm land revealed a remarkable improvement with the implementation of the project. The majority of the investment has been done in on farm activities like construction or renovation of low cost water harvesting structures, construction of overhead water storage structures for drinking purposes, construction of overhead structures for irrigation, installation of drippers and sprinklers, line transplantation of maize and paddy demonstration, soil health improvement through green manuring or applying organic manure, etc.
- Prior to intervention, more than 30% of the arable land was lying fallow even during the Kharif season, due to the absence of scarcity of water and availability of planting materials. Paddy was the major crop. After the intervention, 50% of the arable land is cultivated during the Kharif season due to the better retention of water in the field due to the creation of different water bodies.
- Remarkable changes were noticed in the cropping pattern because of the creation of water bodies like WHS and farm ponds. There was a rise in the water level.
- The productivity of most of the field crops has been increased; this was highest in the case of paddy (25 %).

5. Crop diversification has also been observed; in certain instances, beneficiaries have started cultivating vegetables for which seeds were provided under the project.

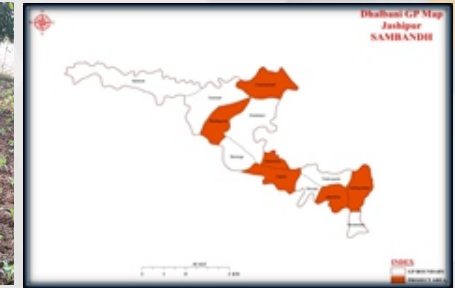
6. It was reported by the majority of the farmers that the wage earned during the execution of different soil and water conservation measures was very beneficial for increasing the livelihood options in the area.



#Cooling chambers:

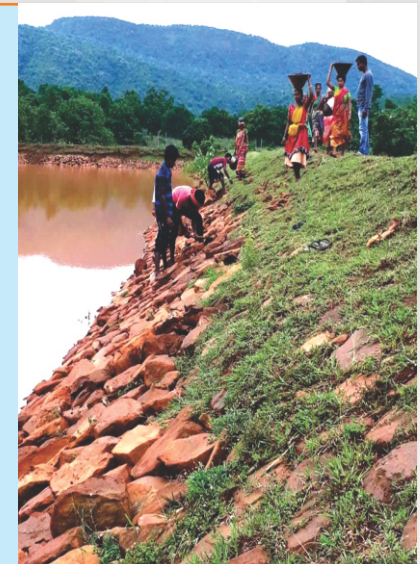
The introduction of cooling chambers in the project has helped the farmers get a better price in the market and earn a profitable income.

The project was conducted in the Dhalabani panchayat of Mayurbhanj district.

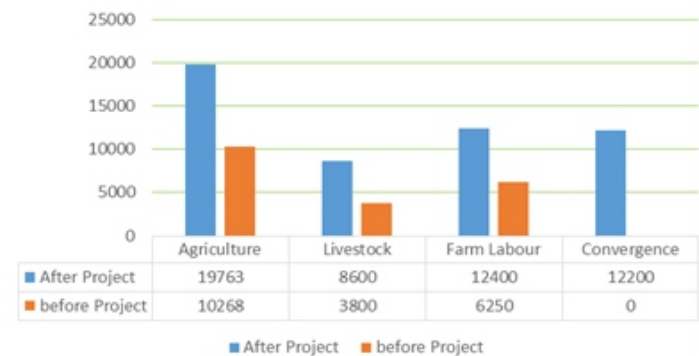


#Case study:

The most encouraging case study was of Biren, who was an unemployed youth. He was supported in undertaking commercial vegetable cultivation for a greater generation of income. He was supported with seeds and other nutrients for fruitful vegetable cultivation. He is a happy farmer, now earning his livelihood.

ICRISAT Bhoochetna Program:

The project focuses on enhancing agricultural productivity and rural livelihoods through the scaling up of science-led development in Odisha. The project is being conducted in the Balasore and Mayurbhanj districts.

Capacity building of the farmers is conducted and they are made aware of the bhoochetna project and various methods and techniques of gaining resourceful cultivation.

With the training/orientation program at ICRISAT and regular follow up by scientists, Sambandh has conducted various training programmes for farmers in the villages on crop diversification, improved agriculture practices, integrated pest management, and other technologies with the involvement of department officials and subject matter specialists.

Continuous training programmes help the capacity building measures of the program, thereby showcasing the long term sustainability of the project.



E-Shakti program:

"E Shakti" is an initiative of Micro Credit and Innovations, whose vision for electronic digital India is to "transform India into a digitally empowered society and a knowledge economy." In layman's terms, the E-shakti intervention will provide and promote digital literacy training that sharpens the critical thinking skills of women, which are the basis for the development of analytic reasoning.

In order to bring a meaningful change in the lives of women, we have touched over 7800 SHGs in Mayurbhanj District, covering 21 blocks. It wants to train the women's groups on digital learning in order to improve the quality of life of women and enable them to live a life of dignity. These are the animators of the Eshakti project who help the women bring about changes in their lives.

Developing Mother Hatchery in Tulasibani watershed area for fingerling production, so that local fingerlings could be supplied to the beneficiaries in appropriate time.

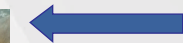

HEIFER INTERNATIONAL – HATCHING HOPE:

The goal of Hatching Hope is to improve the nutrition and economic livelihoods of 1.3 million people by 2030 through innovative approaches that increase consumption and improve the production of poultry. The initiative addresses the challenges of poultry production and consumption, including insufficient inputs, frequent disease outbreaks, lack of regular access, low awareness of the nutritional benefits of poultry, etc., through three main pathways:

1. Implementation of poultry programs in targeted communities that encompass high standards of poultry production practices and nutrition education initiatives designed to improve diets and eating habits;
2. Open source availability of knowledge, resources and technical information on poultry production and consumption that can be easily and readily accessed by producers and communities
3. Creating new business solutions for producers and farming households, including low cost feeding technologies, high quality, low cost poultry housing solutions, and new models of production, processing and marketing

STORY OF BAIJAYANTI:

Baijayanti is a woman in her early 30s with five children. She was involved in some cleaning activities in the village, and she was unable to feed herself and her children properly. Her husband is a daily wage labourer and he himself couldn't arrange food for his family. Under such perilous conditions, she then joined a SHG in her village, which was later selected by Sambandh and Heifer for their training programs. Through various training programs, she gained knowledge on backyard poultry programmes as well as various other training on the commercial cultivation of specific crops. She planted cashew and mango in her garden, and she has also created her own nutrition kitchen garden. Now she is earning her daily income not just from these cultivated plants but also from poultry through proper market linkage. She now has her own bank account and is able to educate her five children. This is a story of change that has inspired many other women in her village, as she has stood out as being one of the role models in her community.



Backyard poultry is an effective intervention for improving nutrition and creating socio-economic transformation. In Pathway One, Hatching Hope India works with Sambandh total of 7500 smallholder farmer households in the Thakurmunda Block in the state of Odisha for a period of two years. The target communities comprise of 2750 existing households from the previous project and 4750 new households. As a result of increased poultry production, an additional 90,000

households (495000 individuals) will benefit from improved access and availability of surplus poultry products for consumption.

The project activities focusses on advanced production of Backyard Poultry (BYP) including breed improvement, consumption of poultry products, marketing of BYP products, strengthening of Farmer Producer Organizations (FPO), etc.

Maa Gruha (Thakurmunda & Jashipur) NHM:

A Maternity Waiting Home (MWH) is a residential facility located near the delivery point where 'high risk' pregnant women can wait for delivery. It is an effective means to 'bridge the geographical gap' and reduce Out of Pocket Spending (OOPS). The institute provide limited accommodation with food to the expecting mothers and attendants. Medical care is provided round the clock with provision of transfer facility to the delivering hospital. It is generally run in partnership mode in vulnerable areas with low institutional deliveries.

Objectives:

1. To establish alternative support infrastructure for addressing communication problems in difficult and inaccessible pockets for ensuring institutional delivery.
2. To increase institutional delivery in the difficult and inaccessible pockets ultimately minimizing maternal & newborn mortality & morbidity.

Before the implementation of the project of maternity waiting homes in Jashipur and Thakurmunda, women used to face an increased gender disparity. They used to be malnourished and anaemic. Proper nutrition and a well-balanced diet were not something that was affordable for them. Therefore, Sambandh, along with NHM, set up MWHs where they provide affordable access to private health facilities in a timely manner for pregnant and lactating women.

They are given the utmost care during their pregnancy period along with regular health checkups. They are especially given proper nourishment through food and supplements, which are highly essential. MWHs have proven to be a boon for the women in the project areas.

HEIFER INTERNATIONAL Training program :

#POULTRY DISEASE OUTBREAK IN ODISHA

The training program was conducted as a awareness program to inform people about the various disease outbreak in Odisha .The major focus was on improving the vaccination drive especially on time so that people would suffer less damage and could incur profit .



Our training program with heifer international has been one of the most successful programs of all time. A wide range of rural population has been provided with the utmost knowledge of the various disease outbreaks in Odisha .

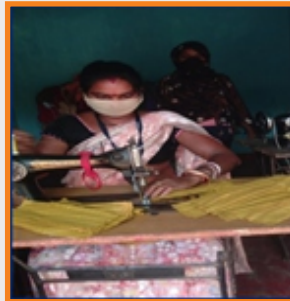
During the pandemic crisis of 2020 , heifer international supported Sambandh by providing relief support to the people of Thakurmunda through 284 SHGs.

The training programme included mask making , phenyl making, and hand wash making. Training was provided to the SHG members, through which they also started earning a livelihood for themselves.



NHM:

#ASHA TRAINING PROGRAM

Sambandh has always promoted the importance of ASHA training and especially the significance of ASHA health workers . Sambandh has always been a part of such initiative and has always put forth the idea that ASHA workers are the key instrument in establishing a better community in the near future.

MEDP program :

#Mayurbhanj economic development program

Over the years, NABARD, Govt. agencies and the non-governmental organizations have been handholding and training group members for livelihood related activities and with small doses of credit and with encouragement from all stakeholders, many of them have taken up income generating activities. A large number of these women have established their own enterprises often in the face of adversity.



Some of them are also running their group enterprises.

It is the first training and development programme which is targeted at women and where women are active participants, taking major decisions themselves. A large number of them have turned entrepreneurs, community leaders and elected

representatives in local bodies. More than anything else it is this social turnaround that deserves to be celebrated most. The MEDP programme is sponsored by the National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD).

The training program has been arranged in such a way that women attendees could start their own ventures. the training targeted at helping the Rural Women to get skilled in Artificial Flower and Soft toy making for micro enterprise development. This empowered household wives for better income and self-sustenance.

It was a proud moment as Mrs. Minati Das of Baba Panchalingeswar SHG, Shyamsundarpur, Balasore was awarded for her entrepreneurship. She has trained SHGs members of 20 Self Help Groups on Paddy craft and the SHG members are earning Rs.2500 to Rs. 3000 per month.

In Mayurbhanj districts Mrs. Subhadra Mohanta & Mrs. Alpana Mohanta two of our SHGs leaders are awarded by NABARD on International women's day for their contribution towards Social security of women, Sanitation drive & Entrepreneurship development.



#Success story:

Name: Pradipta Sabar Age: 40 years (Address: S/o –Late Banka Sabar Vill- Burubahal, P.O.-Kundheigola, P.S.- Kundheigola, Via- Reamal, District- Deogarh)
Pradipta Sabar is a 40 years old Poor farmer of Burubahal a tribal village who belongs to Burubahal Watershed Committee. His family comprises of 5 members i.e. his wife, himself, one son, one daughter and his mother.



He was a very poor farmer, having .In Khariff, 20 acres of land are generally used for paddy cultivation, while the remaining 1 acre is fallow due to water scarcity. He grew vegetables and watered his kitchen garden. Paddy and vegetable cultivation are the main crops for domestic consumption purposes. Moreover, his main source of income was through daily wages. He wanted to do orange plantations and vegetable cultivation for commercial purposes. His measurable financial condition was not materialized due to extreme poverty and low income. He used to live in a very small thatched house.



The Village Watershed Committee member decided to execute a DPRP in Pradipta's big brother wasteland area, which is nearby his land . After the execution of the DPRP, the land was brought under cultivation with the harvested rainwater. After cultivating paddy in.2 acres, which produced 2 quintals of paddy in kharif and rabi seasons, Pradipta cultivated rasi, which was irrigated by canal and SCB built by the Village Watershed Committee. He was also able to grow other crops and gain profit out of them. It helped him a lot in improving his income level. Now he has started living in a pucca house and is earning his income fruitfully.

#Success story:



Mamata Das, w/o- Kishore Das of Khandabandha village & GP, Thakurmunda Block is a very poor ST Women. She kept only 16 BYP in her house. When she got BYP management training & a Model Poultry House (MPH) she dreamed about her future. She reared her BYP in training method gave them vaccine from vaccinator in right time. After she started her venture in BYP and also in cultivation of other vegetables, she has now been earning a sufficient livelihood for herself and her family too.

During the years 2019–20, "Heifer International" and "Sambandh India" started a project named "Hatching Hopes". Through this project, rural women got training in backyard poultry farming such as housing, boarding, feeding, disease control, preventive measures, poultry products and by products, and marketing management. During this period, it was found that this technology needs low input and provides high output in terms of good quality protein, especially for growing and malnourished children. The poultry sector, besides providing direct or indirect employment to women, is also an important tool for secondary income generation for many landless and marginal farmers. It also provides nutritional security, especially to the rural poor. Lack of technical knowledge (75%), high mortality in day old chicks (63%), less availability of chicks and their feed (40%), and economic problems (52%), were the major constraints perceived by backyard poultry farmers in the adoption of backyard poultry farming in Thakurmunda Block, but "Hatching Hopes" brings hope for poor women in that block. It gives them training, knowledge of vaccines and a model poultry house. So they inspired and raised more BYP.

Mamata's aim in life is to give her children a better education, nutritious food and a healthy future.
