



ANNADA - CLIMATE SMART VILLAGE

Sambandh's projection smartvillage (CSV) has a quintessential to it. Our projects under Annada are focused on village development with techniques various technologies. They very presence of the aggrotech park and the Chasi Paathasala have created tremendous effects on the farmers. The regular training programs to various capacity building measures have imperatively helpful in increasing the knowledge base of the farmers. Due to enhanced soil moisture content, 75% of farmers have been able to grow their second crop. A total of 5500 households have fertilized their land using green manure and are getting fresh vegetable for round the year, which is also one of the causes for the reduction in the casesof malnutrition. Various Farmers have increased their income up to Rs.70000 by cultivating peas and beans.. All the climate smart village activities are supportedby EdelGive being Foundation and Azim Premji Foundation.





The project village namely Bhaliaguda and Ramasahi has been promoted as the climate smart village for 2024-2025 due to its tremendous work in addressing climate change and taking various measures starting from organic farming to various water harvesting structures.



This is a unique case study of Champaklata prusty , has been cultivating paddy on her 2.7 acres of cultivable land for several years. She faced significant financial difficulties. The income from paddy cultivation alone was insufficient to meet the needs of her family of nine. Frustrated with the low returns from traditional farming methods, Champaklata shared her concerns with a community member from our organization. Understanding her situation, our team provided her with training on low-cost vegetable cultivation. This training also included preparation and implementation of organic manure. Along with the training we also provided her some tomato seeds, neem oil, and essential micronutrients to improve crop health and yield. With this support, she diversify her farming and dedicated 0.5 acres of her land to tomato cultivation and another 0.5 acres to growing chickpeas. The results of this intervention was highly encouraging, Champaklata harvested 12.3 quintals of tomatoes, which earned her ₹24,600. In addition to this, she earned ₹3,000 from the chickpea harvest. The combined profit of ₹27,600 significantly boosted her income. With part of her profit, she reinvested in her farm by purchasing maize and brinjal seeds. She also deposited the remaining amount in her bank account. This achievement of farming not only increased her income but also helped her explore sustainable agricultural practices. Through her successful adoption of vegetable cultivation, she has set an example for other farmers in her community

ARANYANI - SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD THROUGH FARM AND NON-FARM ACTIVITIES

The ARANYANI program represents SAMBANDH's Climate Change 1. Enhanced Cropping in Adaptation Initiative, employing a climate - resilient approach and Rabi mitigation strategies to enhance the livelihood sustainability of SC and increment by 40 hectares. ST households. This comprehensive program focuses on Integrated Legume crops (black-gram, Watershed Management, the promotion of organic cultivation green-gram, bengal gram), practices, the preservation of traditional seeds and training oil beneficiaries on the sustainable use of resources such as land, water sesame), and vegetables and forests.



ARANYANI is a holistic effort towards sustainable livelihoods, encompassing various farming and non-farming activities. These activities include saal leaf plate making, tamarind cake production, honey and cashew processing through promotion of Farmers Producers Organizations (FPOs), sale of Non-Timber Forest Products (NTFPs), herbal medicine, and more. This multifaceted approach aims to empower communities and foster resilient, climate smart livelihoods. This project is supported by NABARD, Essel Mining & Industries Limited.

Case study on Padmini Behera

Padmini Behera, from Begunia village, lives with her husband and three children. The family relied mostly on daily wage labour and earned just enough to survive. Though Padmini owned 1.6 acres of land, only 1 acre was used for paddy cultivation, while 0.6 acres lay fallow for years.

In 2023, she came in contact with Sambandh under their Kitchen Garden/Nutrition Garden initiative. She received seed kits, fencing materials, and training on organic farming and management. Motivated, Padmini started cultivating maize and cowpea on the unused 0.6 acres. Her first attempt earned her ₹17,980 - a turning point that boosted her confidence. Since then, she has continued farming vegetables like tomato, radish,





potato, and ridge gourd while maintaining her kitchen garden for fresh greens. This has improved her family's nutrition and given them a steady source of food and income. Today, Padmini balances daily wage work with farming and has become a confident, resourceful farmer making full use of her land.

WATERSHED PROJECTS

Watershed management is essential, especially in areas with potential drought and limited water resources to improve river flow, agricultural stability, soil fertility, conservation of water and soil resources and livelihoods for communities around the watershed area. Watershed management combines science, technology and humanity to implement water and soil conservation measures. Successful watershed management can impact not only a small hydrological scale but also areas outside the watershed boundary. Exemplary management implementation has also positively affected externalities related to ground water and surface water flow.

Watershed management is essential for environment protection since it comprises the management of biota, land, ecosystems and other ecologically designated resources. This method can preserve ecological balance while assuring long term viability of land based and water based resources.

Sambandh's watershed programme, Deogarh District, Reamal Block - Burubahal and Jharabereni watershed is supported by NABARD since 2019





Niranjan Sahu, a marginal farmer from Reamal block of Deogarh, owned 2 acres of land, half of which lay fallow due to water scarcity, degraded slopy soil, and limited knowledge of modern farming. Financial constraints forced him to stick to mono-cropping, leaving little hope for improvement. Under the WDF project, SAMBAND stepped in with a series of interventions that changed his farming journey. Niranjan received training and exposure visits, a recharge pit was constructed to harvest water, and crop planning was done as per the land's capacity. He adopted diversified cropping, crop rotation, vegetable cultivation, and even fisheries. With linkage support, he planted oranges on 0.5 acre upland, introduced maize as intercrop, and practiced paddy line transplanting for better yield. These efforts resulted in increased water availability for Kharif and Rabi crops, improved soil use, and a significant rise in production. In just one year, Niranjan earned an additional ₹80,000, turning his once-fallow land into a thriving farm. His story stands as an inspiration, proving that determination and the right support can transform challenges into opportunities and lead to a better livelihood.

ADHARSILA -LIVELIHOOD THROUGH LIVESTOCK AND SOCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY

In the pursuit of sustainable livelihoods, SAMBANDH champions the empowerment of women and landless individuals. Through initiatives like training, business plan development and credit linkages, especially within women self-help groups (SHGs); we've fostered income generating activities like vegetable cultivation, goat rearing and poultry farming.

Our livestock management program, led predominantly by women, includes the innovative concept of bio secure villages. This ensures income generation through direct channels, eliminating middlemen exploitation and improving market access. Partnering with Heifer International, SAMBANDH has made substantial strides in providing sustainable income, particularly empowering women in project areas.

In partnership with eight key blocks, including SAMBANDH, our transformative project (TRANSFORM) extends its reach across Thakurmunda, Jashipur, Karanjia, Udala, and Rasgovindpur Blocks in Mayurbhani district and Ghatagaon, Harichandanpur and Telkoi block in Keonjhar district, Odisha. Collaborating with esteemed partners PRADAN, SOOVA, UNNAYAN, WOSCA and RVDO; we are dedicated to addressing the unique challenges faced by smallholder farmers. Engaging with a community of 39,500 farmers, our initiatives encompass holistic training programs, spanning Community Agro-vet Entrepreneur and farmer training, coupled with impactful Social Behavioral Change, Communication initiatives. This programme is supported by USAID, HEIPHER INTERNATIONAL and CARGII.



Case Study on Shanti Hembram

Shanti Hembram from Kadapani village, Thakurmunda block, is a shining example of women's empowerment. A member of the Jhansirani SHG since 2017, she started poultry and goat farming with loans supported by the SAMBANDH Heifer project. Through capacity-building trainings in farming, business, and biosecurity, Shanti steadily increased her income.

Today, she earns about ₹1.59 lakh annually from poultry, goat rearing, paddy, and vegetable cultivation. With her earnings, she has bought a scooter, invested in her children's education, and begun constructing a new house. Trained in SHG management, kitchen gardening, and disaster management, Shanti is now confident, financially independent, and an inspiration to other rural women striving for a better life.





UNIQUE CONCEPT

FODDER GARDEN

A fodder garden is a specialized area where plants are cultivated specifically to provide feed for livestock. These gardens focus on growing nutritious plants those can be harvested and used as animal feed, ensuring a consistent and reliable food source for animals. Common plants in a fodder garden include Drumstick, Jack fruit, Apple bear, Gmelina arborea, Subabul, Maize, cowpea, Anant Grass, Napier grass, Agasti, Gliricidia, etc.

The major benefits of a fodder garden include reducing dependence on commercial feed, promoting better animal health, and ensuring sustainable and cost-effective food source for animals. By growing different kind of fodder plants, the farmers ensure that their livestock has consume a wide range of nutritional food which is must needed for wellbeing of the livestock.





BIO-SECURE VILLAGE

A bio-secure village dedicated to hen cultivation represents a high standard of biosecurity designed to ensure the health and safety of poultry. This specialized facility is a restricted area where hens are raised under carefully controlled conditions to prevent disease and contamination. Access to the village is tightly regulated, with only authorized personnel permitted entry to maintain stringent hygiene protocols and prevent external pathogens from affecting the flock. The bio-secure environment includes measures such as sanitized equipment, protective clothing for workers, and strict quarantine procedures. By maintaining such rigorous controls, the biosecure village aims to produce healthy, highquality hens while minimizing the risk of disease outbreaks.

ABHIJAN - A MOVEMENT TOWARDS NUTRITIONAL SECURITY

In our commitment to community well-being, we have established over 6,497 kitchen gardens across diverse project areas through our own initiatives, community collaboration, and partnerships. This effort ensures a year-round supply of fresh vegetables and nutrient-rich leafy greens, improving nutrition and promoting healthier lifestyles.

At the heart of this achievement is our Nutrition Garden model—a sustainable, organic, and self-reliant approach that is now being adopted beyond our project areas. By fostering food security and resilience, this model has made a significant impact on community health and well-being.



Significant Achievements: 25% Reduction in Anemia cases: Achieved a notable 25% reduction in malnutrition-related anemia cases within project locations, reflecting transformative changes in the food habits of tribal beneficiaries.

Improved food security and income generation:
Introduction of sustainable concepts resulted in regular food supplies to vulnerable communities, providing an avenue for income generation through vegetable sale, contributing to overall well-being.

MAJOR IMPACT: Sustainable Organic Agriculture Practices: Spearheading efforts for sustainable organic agriculture practices to 75% enhance community food and nutritional security.

Women's Empowerment through dietary Management and nutrition training: Providing comprehensive training to 80% women in the community through dietary management and nutrition-focused education.

Backyard nutritional kitchen gardens: Promoting the establishment of backyard nutritional kitchen gardens to more than 85% increase access to diverse and wholesome food options at the community level.

Case study on Kapura Tudu

Kapura Tudu from Kathithikana lives with her husband and young son. With no agricultural land of their own, the family relied on her husband's daily wage work and seasonal forest produce. They spent nearly ₹10,000 annually on vegetables to meet their basic needs. To grow some food, Kapura had leased 0.5 acres to cultivate paddy during the rainy season, but production was low, leaving the family food and nutrition insecure.



In 2023, with support from Sambandh, Kapura received two goats, vegetable seeds, fencing, and training on composting, organic farming, and kitchen garden management. She started cultivating vegetables year-round using organic methods, which now meet her family's nutritional needs and generate surplus for sale. The goats have become an additional income source, further strengthening the family's livelihood.

Today, Kapura has reduced her dependence on market-purchased vegetables, saved money, improved her family's nutrition, and achieved greater economic stability through integrated farming and kitchen gardening.



ASHA - NURTURING FOR BETTER TOMORROW

Nutrition has always been a key concern for humanity, and Sambandh has worked to promote healthy food habits among vulnerable communities in Odisha since its inception. To support maternal and child health, Sambandh launched the Maternity Waiting Home (MWH) project in 2008 under the National Health Mission, providing care, nutritious food, and health facilities for pregnant and lactating women.

Through the MAA GRUHA initiative in Jashipur and Thakurmunda, we address challenges of institutional delivery in remote areas by offering expectant mothers a safe stay 7–10 days before delivery. This public-private partnership ensures timely medical care, improves institutional delivery rates, and reduces maternal and newborn mortality.

HWC PROJECT

The Health Wellness Centre (HWC) project in Mayurbhanj district focuses on enhancing primary healthcare services across 9 different blocks. In this initiative, a total of 32 staff members have been appointed, including Auxiliary Nurse Midwives (ANMs) and health workers, with each block receiving one. The primary goal of the HWC project is to ensure accessible and quality healthcare at the grassroot level by providing preventive, promotive, and curative health services. These centres aim to strengthen community health by offering services such as maternal and child health care, disease prevention, immunization, and health education. The presence of both ANMs and health workers in each block ensures a comprehensive approach to healthcare delivery, targeting vulnerable population and improving overall health outcomes in the region.



THE SWAHAR PROJECT

The SWAHAR Project (launched in Jan 2024) is supported by United Way India (UWI), Essel Mining & Industries Limited, and the Aditya Birla Group. It aims to improve the well-being of 2,000 households through holistic, community-driven development. The project focuses on social, economic, and environmental challenges, emphasizing capacity building, participation, and sustainability. By enhancing living standards, fostering social cohesion, and boosting economic resilience, SWAHAR serves as a model for impactful public-private partnerships driving lasting community change.

Case Study on Sabita Choudhury

Sabita Choudhury and her husband, Birsha, struggled to survive on his daily wage earnings while caring for their bedridden son and severely malnourished 1.3-year-old daughter, Dasmati, who weighed just 6 kg. Living in a remote tribal area with no land to cultivate, Sabita was overwhelmed and sinking into depression as Dasmati's health declined rapidly.

A concerned community volunteer reported the case to SAMBANDH, which immediately provided Chhatua Protein Food and guided Sabita on proper feeding practices. Gradually, Dasmati's health improved, giving the family renewed hope. SAMBANDH also supported them with income-generating resources to build a more secure future.

Sabita expresses her gratitude: "I had lost all hope, but SAMBANDH brought my child back to life and gave us the strength to move forward."





AROGYAM - REVIVAL OF TRADITIONAL HEALTHCARE PRACTICES

Sambandh's Arogyam program stands as the cornerstone of our organization, propelling us to SAMBANDH has consistently championed women's empowerment by promoting remarkable heights. This core initiative focuses on reviving and mainstreaming local indigenous and strengthening Self-Help Groups (SHGs). We provide training, business plan knowledge in health, agriculture, and veterinary practices. The impact has been substantial, leading to policy-level changes and recognition of indigenous knowledge and practices. rearing, poultry, honey collection, and mushroom cultivation. The focus is on However, the pressing challenges posed by climate change underscore the need to prioritize the preservation of indigenous knowledge, resources, and practices.

Drawing from our experiences and lessons learned, it has become apparent that traditional knowledge on local health practices is often scattered and predominantly oral. Recognizing the potential loss of this rich knowledge with each passing generation, we have taken proactive measures. To date, we have compiled 576 Community Knowledge Registers, serving as invaluable repositories of knowledge for generations to come.

Our collaboration with over 5000 vaidyas (traditional healers) across the state has been a resounding success for Sambandh. This success reached new heights this year when one of our distinguished vaidyas, Shri Patayat Sahu, received the prestigious Padma Shree award from Honourable President of India.

ETHNO VETERINARY - IT'S IMPORTANTANCE IN AROGYAM

India has one of the sophisticated medical cultures with a tradition of over 5000 years. Livestock owners in India have been using traditional medication based on plant formulations since time immemorial. Ethnoveterinary medicine is the holistic interdisciplinary study of the local knowledge and the socio-cultural structures and environment associated with animal healthcare and husbandry. This form of practice holds high significance in Sambandh's Arogyam program as the very practice of traditional system of medicine has empowered many vaidya sanghas to be formed, thus, disseminating their knowledge in the form of documentation and knowledge registers. The aim of the project is to provide appropriate technical knowledge on modern line Jute Craft and marketing to 90 active members of 18 WSHGs (5 members from each group) by strengthening their entrepreneurial skill in a sustainable manner through Livelihood and Enterprise Development Programme (LEDP) in Bahanaga Block of Baleswar District, Odisha. The project aimed to produce different kinds and designs of traditional packaging fabrics, carpet backing, mats, trendy bag, tarpaulins, lampshades, ropes, twines, decorative items, footwear, greetings cards, molded door panels, table placemats and other useful consumer products such as jute bags, conference files, home decorates through the capacity building of the members and group action.

The Odisha Millet Mission (OMM) is a vital initiative aimed at reviving millet cultivation, ensuring nutritional security and improving farmers' livelihoods. Under this mission, millet cultivation has been initiated in two blocks, namely Bahalda in Mayurbhanj district and Nilagiri in Baleswar district. These efforts focus on enhancing productivity, promoting consumption, and creating a sustainable market for millets.

APURBA - SUSTAINABLE BIO DIVERSITY BUSINESS

The program aims to improve small producers' livelihoods by forming federations of producer groups and FPOs to enable aggregation, shared services, and price-risk mitigation. Sambandh has set up FPOs, SHG federations, and individual SHGs in project areas.

Mushrooms, valued for their flavor, nutrition, and medicinal properties, are low in calories and rich in fiber and protein. However, rural communities gain limited benefit from the mushroom industry. Sustainable collection and sale of wild mushrooms remain an important source of income for

these communities.

We manage four Farmer Organizations Producer (FPOs) across the blocks of Jashipur, Thakurmunda, Reamal and Bahalda. The FPOs have diverse focus on Non-Timber Forest Products (NTFP). vegetables, honey, livestock and pulses. In the financial year 2024-25, this FPO achieved a turnover 1,25,99,196/-, demonstrating its impact on local livelihoods and the rural economy.

The FPOs serve as crucial platforms for farmers, offering collective marketing opportunities, enhancing income generation, and promoting sustainable agricultural practices. Through the combined efforts of these FPOs, we aim to empower small-scale farmers and contribute to the overall agricultural growth of the region.





ANWESHA - THE LIVING LABORATORY

ANWESHA, a model knowledge park, is established at Choudwar in Cuttack district, as well as in Jashipur and Thakurmunda in Mayurbhanj district. This innovative initiative operates in a multi-dimensional capacity, focusing on preservation and propagation of diverse indigenous medicinal and horticultural plants. Additionally, ANWESHA features a built-in training center, offering comprehensive training sessions on various aspects of livelihood, Natural Resource Management (NRM) and health. The park also conducts field demonstrations on various agricultural practices and skill-building activities.

The major goal of ANWESHA programme is the establishment of knowledge cum training centres, where various orientations and training programmes are conducted with regards to governance, sustainable livelihood, health, natural resource management, bio-diversity conservation, climate smart agriculture practices, learnings on the traditional systems of medicines, organic manure preparation, and also it is consider as central point for the farmers for interaction with various agricultural experts. SAMBANDH has developed three such centres in Bhubaneswar, Choudwar, and Jashipur. This financial year we have trained around 3093 no. of local farmers, women and PRI representatives at our resource centres.

CHAASI PATHSALA

Chasi pathsala is a concept which brings together farmers (both male & female), livestock stock holders, and other members of the community to learn on how shift towards more sustainable production practices, by better understanding complex agro eco-system and by enhancing eco-system services. The very idea of developing Chaasi pathsala by Sambandh is not just for knowledge enhancement but in fact it is currently acting as a source of livelihood as well. Trained farmers from Chaasi pathsala are now able to teach what they have learnt in the nearby villages. They charge a nominal amount from the fellow farmers and the community as well. Such a scenario is only possible because of the presence of demo fields which are attached as part of the chasi pathsala.

Experimental innovations on such fields lead to farmers to have discussion with agriculture experts through video conferencing in the chasi pathsala, which ultimately helps them in resolving their perplexity, thus, enhancing their knowledge master farmer trainer (both male & female), who are then ready to guide the rest of the community.



ANKURAN - A JOURNEY THROUGH REFORESTATION

ANKURAN is an innovative initiative aimed at promoting reforestation through the plantation of native wild trees. Recognizing the urgent need to combat climate change, restore ecosystems, and enhance biodiversity, ANKURAN focuses on revitalizing degraded and fostering sustainable environmental practices.

OBJECTIVES:

1. Reforestation:

ANKURAN seeks to restore forest cover by planting native species those are well-adapted to local ecosystem. This not only helps in carbon sequestration, but also supports the wildlife depending on these habitats.

2.Bio-diversity Enhancement:

By focusing on indigenous trees, ANKURAN aims to increase biodiversity, which is crucial for maintaining ecological balance and resilience against climate change.

3. Sustainable Practices:

ANKURAN promotes environment friendly techniques in planting and maintenance to ensure the longevity and health of newly planted trees.

4. Community Engagement:

The programme actively involves local communities in the plantation process. Education and training sessions are conducted to raise awareness about the importance of trees and sustainable practices.





ABHIPSA - PLANTATION WITH PERENNIALS TO MINIMIZE GREENHOUSE EMISSIONS

APHIPSA promotes for the conservation of unutilized non- agricultural degraded land into horticultural orchard and are managed to minimize greenhouse emissions and maximize the sequestration of carbon in soils and vegetation which is good for environment and also it give some way of income generation. Majorly the orchard comprises of mango and cashew plantations which is a good source of income.

WADI PROJECT-Supported by NABARD

The WADI project, initiated in 2023 in Kusumi block of Mayurbhani district, which is comes under our honorable president's area, is making significant strides enhancing local agriculture and promoting sustainable development. This initiative focuses on the plantation of mango and cashew trees, with an impressive achievement of more than 200 acres already completed and households covered.

By integrating these fruitbearing plants, the project aims to improve the livelihood of local farmers while promoting biodiversity. The WADI project not only supports economic growth in the region, but also environmental fosters conservation. Through this initiative, the community is poised to reap both ecological and financial benefits for years to come.







BIBHU KALYAN PRATIBHA SAMMAN 2024

In Odisha, agriculture & allied sectors have provided ample of opportunities to majority of people for sustaining their livelihood. Constant efforts of individuals and community groups have contributed immensely for successful production of crop and various commodities. They have utilized acquired skill and inherent knowledge to enhance production, ultimately contributing to food security. There is strong need to recognize such talents residing in various parts of the state. To fulfil the requirement, Sambandh has initiated an innovative action entitled "Bibhu Kalyan Pratibha Samman" with an objective to recognize successful farmers and community based organizations for their commendable contributions. This is instituted in loving memory of Late Dr Bibhu Kalyan Mohanty, the founder of Sambandh. 



